The Snohomish Boat Launch is located at Julia's Landing, a 20-acre property at 20 Lincoln Avenue along the Snohomish River.

It is a City-owned and maintained recreation facility surrounded by unimproved future parkland.

The facility's parking lot has eight trailer spaces, two ADA-

accessible spaces, 11 standard spaces and overflow parking.

The boat launch was built to replace the city's damaged and deteriorated Cady Park boat launch off of First Street.

The Cady Park boat launch has been retained for hand launched, non-motorized boats.

Visit Blackman House Museum

Take a step back in time to the 19th Century when you enter Snohomish's Blackman House Museum.

This structure was originally built as a small farmhouse in 1879 for Hyrcanus Blackman, an early settler of Snohomish. He lived in the house with his wife and two children. Later, Blackman's daughter, Eunice, lived there with her husband, Dr. W.S. Ford.

In the 1930s, Dr. Ford enclosed the entrance to the home to create a sunroom for Eunice's plants.

The home was family-owned until 1970 when it was purchased and restored by the Snohomish Historical Society.

Much of the furniture in the Museum came from Emory C. Ferguson, the founding father of Snohomish, and the Norman Lenfest family.

The original etched-glass

door and some of the original wallpaper, carpets, furniture and pictures remain intact and on display in the home. The Historical Society arranged the furniture using

photographs of the inside of old Victorian homes.

The museum is open by appointment only at this time. For tour information, call 360-568-5235.

Discover Snohomish

Historic Downtown Snohomish has much to offer visitors and residents alike. Downtown is a multi-use area that appeals to many different customers. Retail and gift shops, restaurants and coffee houses, antique stores, entertainment, and a wide variety of other businesses that are all part of the mix.

The City of Snohomish had a redevelopment plan in 1965 that proposed the destruction of the historic structures along First Street in order to make way for a covered mall. Fortunately, the plan was not carried out due to

lack of available funds and as a result, the area remains today as it has through much of history.

In the 1990s, First Street was redeveloped to take advantage of its historic buildings as a tourist attraction. The sidewalks were rebuilt and public restrooms were added in order to further serve the community and visitors. The city hall and police station were moved away from First Street and a new fire station was built, allowing those historic buildings to be renovated.

Today, Snohomish is very

much a model of how cities can reinvigorate their business districts by preserving their historic charm. The town has continued to grow with much of the development to the north along Bickford Avenue. The city has nurtured a great balance between regular businesses in modern facilities which serve the community and specialty shops in the historic part of town.

Come stroll along First Street and admire the architecture and murals, enjoy refreshments at the many establishments and discover the great treasures to be found at many of the shops.

Haunts of Snohomish

Spirits linger around every corner of the Historic District downtown.

While shoppers bustling through may not see the town's haunted history, some residents know the unworldly inhabitants by name, while others know them by their chilling touch.

The spirit of a little girl, Sybill Sibley, aged 10, is well known at the Cabbage Patch Restaurant on Avenue A.

Employees have reported apparitions of the child who died in 1930.

"At one time the house next door was a rental house, that had an outdoor porch behind it, and (my neighbor's) 5-year-old son was talking to a girl, 10-years-old." After the mother questioned her boy, she told the owner Sondra McCutchan, "you won't believe this." The boy said his new friend's name was Sybill.

The Oxford Saloon on First Street, one of the city's most storied, has carried its violent past with it through a century, until it now teems with as many as 45 spirits by one account.

Overseeing them all is Kathleen, a brothel madam who was decapitated in her clawfoot bathtub by a discontented customer according to owner Brian Swanson.

Staff have had knives fly down at them, and pots and pans jump their hooks, said a bar manager.

Many female visitors have reported encounters, with the sharp touch of cool fingers pinching them says Deverie Wood, a storyteller who specializes in Snohomish ghost tales.

Legend has it the handsy phantom was a bordello client aptly named John. He may be kept partly in check by a member of Snohomish's

own police force of yore, in the disembodied form of Henry, an officer who moonlighted as a bouncer. He met his end late one night, stabbed to death while trying to break up a brawl between two gamblers.

But the most disturbing manifestation from beyond the grave may be the form of a child's doll whose glassy eyes have surveyed the Oxford for many years.

Antique shop owners who were former tenants sold the doll to a wealthy New York family, only to return her with a note months later. They wanted neither a refund or exchange, but to have nothing to do with the doll ever again. A second sale followed, but the dolly was dropped off after midnight with a similar note and has lived at the Oxford since.

Bar manager Rebecca Cadden knew better than to disturb the spirit in the figurine, but had to when her boss recently instructed her to move the doll away from customers who might be tempted to swipe her.

The nightmares began soon after.

"I was being drowned, suffocated, choked ... someone

shoved a sheet down my throat," Cadden remembered. When she told a coworker about the night terrors, they replied: "you know, Rebecca, the story with her (first owner) is how she probably suffocated and died."

Local library lovers know an entirely gentle spirit, the former 1920s and '30s librarian Catharine McMurchy. The eminently civilized and kind McMurchy was known to help children at the old Carnegie Library on Cedar Avenue.

"The first year doing my (storytelling) tour I had two parents and daughter" who "came up afterward, the last to leave. 'I'm so happy she was a nice ghost,'" Wood recalls the child saying about the lovely talk she'd had with Ms. McMurchy.

McMurchy's presence may have signaled unfinished business. Former Snohomish librarian Mike Malone found that his predecessor had been buried with indigent status and no grave marker. In 2002 he rectified that wrong, forever memorializing her as a "Cherished Snohomish Librarian" on a marker at Seattle's Evergreen-Washelli Cemetery.

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The Centennial Trail is a popular recreation destination

The Centennial Trail is an enormously popular recreational trail for walking, bicycling, hiking, and horseback riding and is accessible to persons of

all levels of physical ability. A separate six foot wide equestrian trail runs parallel to the ten foot wide paved trail. The trail is lined with benches and picnic tables for your convenience. Portable style restrooms are located at the trailheads.

The trail, now over 30-miles long, provides a safe alternative transportation route and extends from Snohomish to Skagit County. Eventually the trail route will be from the Bothell area to Skagit County. The county is also considering extending the Centennial Trail from Snohomish to Monroe.

The closest trailhead to Snohomish is located at 5801 S. Machias Rd., just north of town. There is also parking available along the north end of Maple Avenue for outdoor recreational enthusiasts.

Trail users are also invited to visit the trailhead and rest stop in the community of Machias. This facility is

a replica of a railroad depot built in the late 1890s. The depot once served a rail line which today is the Centennial Trail. The Machias Trailhead facility is available for rent. Call (425)388-6600 or e-mail scsparksrec@gmail.com for reservations.

The trail is open for use during regular park hours, from 7 am to dusk. The trailheads are locked during off-hours.

Park History:

The Centennial Trail is constructed on the original

railway right-of-way built in 1889. The railway eventually connected Seattle with Canada and linked Everett with Stevens Pass. Operation ceased on the Hartford-Edgcomb section in 1972 and on the Snohomish- Hartford section in 1987. In King County, a section of this same abandoned railway line has become Seattle's heavily-used Burke-Gilman Trail, and the Sammamish River Trail.

The railroad provided local and international mail, freight, and passenger service. It carried timber from the

forests, lumber from the saw mills, and iron, copper, lead, silver, and gold from Mount Pilchuck and Monte Cristo mines. Tourists could ride in open rail cars to Monte Cristo and back for the day, winding through the steep canyons of the South Fork Stillaguamish River, or go to the Big Four Inn at the ice caves on the "Mountain Loop" to the east.

Development of the trail began in 1989 during the state's centennial, hence the name, Centennial Trail.

Snohomish Aquatic Center enjoyed by everyone



Aquatic wonderland is certainly one way to describe the 52,000-square-foot facility that for many is a dream come true for the community.

Among the many activities offered at the Snohomish Aquatic Center is swim lessons for children and adults.

The center is split into two main areas: the recreation side and the natatorium side.

On the recreation side are all the family-oriented “fun” pool perks, such as a recreation pool, warm-water therapy pool, spray-play and zero-entry area for children, the Flowrider, a lazy river and the Splashtacular water slide.

The Flowrider is a surf-simulation machine—the only of its kind in the area—crosses snowboarding, skateboarding and wakeboarding into an

exciting ride with plenty of challenges and a whole lot of fun! Guests must be 42-inches tall to ride the boogie boards and 52-inches tall to ride the stand-up boards.

“This is an aquatic wonderland,” said Kristin Foley, spokeswoman for the Snohomish School District, which built the facility. “Both sides (of the pool areas, separated by a large window) are saline. Our water is a saline system that produces natural chlorine. There are different bodies of water that are all inter-connected. Our lazy river is not very lazy. It moves along pretty quickly and kids love it!”

On the natatorium side of the facility is the much-needed competition swimming pool.

The 10-lane, 25-yard by 25-meter pool boasts a

technologically advanced Colorado timing system, complete with touch pads and time board. It also holds a deep diving well and two diving boards, as well as 10 starting blocks. The natatorium can seat 420 spectators.

“We have this large glass window, so that the two areas — the Rec side and the competition pool side — can operate independently of each other,” Foley said. “So if there’s a swim meet over (on the natatorium side), we can still have the rec side open.”

Profits made from admission fees, lessons, parties, etc. go straight into the school district’s general fund.

Snohomish Teen Center

The Boys and Girls Club of Snohomish Teen Center boasts a large e-gaming space with eight computers and six TV monitors.

The Club also has a working DJ booth, LED light fixtures, multiple board games, and a kitchen.

In addition to the new technology in the Teen Center, the computer lab available to all ages unveiled a new look as the Comcast Lift Zone. This space now has a color 3D printer, a small AI robot, a podcast studio, a smart board, and many computers available to Boys and Girls Club members.

Funding was the biggest

hurdle in building the Teen Center, but individuals and organizations all over the Snohomish community pitched in to make this space a reality. The Snohomish Lions Club and Snohomish Kiwanis were both instrumental donors to the construction of the Teen Center, with the Lions Club alone donating \$75,000. Gaffney Construction also provided an incredible amount of support, building the Teen Center in just nine months.

The Boys and Girls Club hopes to extend their hours on weekends so teenagers will be encouraged to spend

more time at The Club. “Here it’s safe,” said Mayor Linda Redmon. “They have good mentorship and somebody to tell them they’re important, and that they have possibility and potential in their life. I mean what could be more important?”

The new Teen Center and Lift Zone offers a space for Snohomish youth to relax, play, and educate themselves. “Kids will be learning without even knowing,” Sabbagh said.

As Redmon puts it, “just come check it out.”
